

## PechaKucha Presentation

- What is a PechaKucha?
  - A PechaKucha presentation is a format using 20 slides or images that are displayed for 20 seconds each. The slides will move automatically as the presenter is speaking. This format ensures that the speaker is concise, keeps the presentation moving, and gets through all of their content in about 6 minutes and 40 seconds (400 seconds total). Using visuals and images instead of text-filled slides is encouraged.
- Where did the idea come from?
  - PechaKucha, in Japanese, means “chit chat.” PechaKuchas presentations were created in Tokyo in 2003 by architects Astrid Klein and Mark Dytham. They introduced it as a platform for young designers to come together, showcase their work, and exchange ideas through brief presentations. The core principle behind PechaKucha was to "talk less, show more.”
- Creating a PechaKucha
  - Create an outline for your presentation including important visuals or graphics you'd like to use.
  - Write a script following your outline, making sure it will stay in the 20 seconds per slide limits.
  - Create a 20 slide presentation with visuals, images, and minimal text that coordinates with your script.
  - Practice, practice, practice and present!

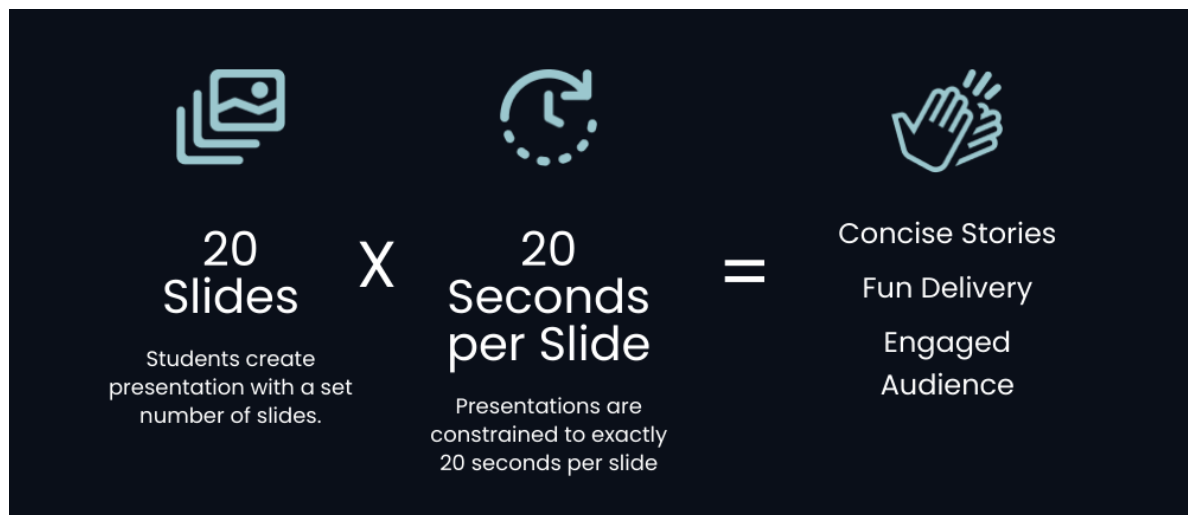
